
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

He has participated in many major video exhibitions in the U.S. and numerous video tapes, as well as having developed his own computer controlled video imaging system. electronically into a remarkable multi-channel composition. Steina attended the Music Conservatory in Prague and was a violinist in the Icelandic Symphony Orchestra until she immigrated in 1965 to the U.S. where she became

involved in video. She established herself as a seminal force in the development of the electronic arts, both as cofounder, with Woody Vasulka, of The Kitchen (a major exhibition center in New York) and as a continuing explorer of the possibilities for the generation and manipulation of the electronic image. Her tapes have been exhibited and broadcast extensively in the U.S. and Europe. She is a 1976 Guggenheim Fellow and has received numerous other grants. Steina currently resides in Santa Fe. 



CCA offers monthly workshops in video production and post-production techniques. This intensive two and one-half day workshop will cover the fundamentals of video camera work and editing through a combination of theory and

hands-on practice. Students will participate in the production of a short video tape from production planning to final edit. Emphasis will be on exploring the basic skills of videography; use of equipment, composition, and editing essentials. The workshop is limited to 6 students. Tuition is \$160 (CCA members \$150).

RITA DeWITT, Not Just Another Pretty Miss. Rita DeWitt works with the Xerox 6500 Color Copier to produce electrostatic images on paper and fabric which are then extended through the use of collage and drawing. Her most recent pieces were produced using a 20" x 24' polaroid camera. DeWitt's images are pulled from the icons of our society, history of family, and perceptions of self. Her work is in the collections of the Fogg Art Museum, Cambridge, Mass.; High Museum of Art in Atlanta and others.

'Carl Stone composes with electronics as Mahler composed for orchestra or Chopin wrote for the piano. He shows that both electronic music and music based on logical processes don't have to be cold. If I were making a list of the best composers working in this country today, I'd rank him very high." — Gregory Sandow, Village Voice. Stone builds his music from pure electronic sounds as well as from natural sounds and the sounds of acoustic instruments, sometimes using fragments of familiar musical pieces, electronically reproduced. "He is a sonic purist who rarely introduces distortion or otherwise tampers with sound, but instead delves deep inside sound and does so with ingenious and elegant applications of technology... profoundly satisfying."—Mark Swed, L.A. Weekly. His electronic transformations create sounds entirely new and never before heard, sometimes the aural equivalent of an Escher etching.

Carl Stone will premiere new works in his Santa Fe concert in which he and his computer will operate the musical equipment in a performance that is fascinating to watch, as well. Stone, who is currently based in Los Angeles, studied with Morton Subotnick and James Tenney. His works have been performed in the U.S., Canada, Europe, Japan, Australia, South America and the Near East, and have been released on Wizard Records and New Underground label.


