This fear of technology in art is glaringly apparent in the way that the art of photography, now 150 years old, is treated by the perhaps one hundred top-ranking German art museums. Almost all important North American art museum have, in the meantime, established a section for photography, and in the U.S. alone, six art museums have set up a video department. In comparison, the Federal Republic of Germany makes a disgraceful showing: here, exactly TWO art museums were prepared, in the past two years, to set up at least one photography division, and a single museum-albeit already since early in the 70's-has a video department: the Folkwang Museum in Essen, which presented the comprehensive and highly informative "Videowochen Essen" (Video Weeks in Essen) in November, 1979.

5. The final point is related, at least in content, to the foregoing one. Many German video artists combine their concern with themselves, with their individual problems and viewpoints, with a theme burdened by cultural paraphenalia, often oriented to the literary. Several German artists use the medium precisely in order to illustrate the connections between contemporary thought and the past. Thus, the medium often appears dryer and more inflexible, or - as stated in Le Monde on June 12, 1980 - "austere". These works, which consciously correspond with artistic traditions, the missing links to popular television and the technical toy of electronics, seem to be typical and characteristic of German video artist, in contrast to the North American scene, in the 'New World', access to the media is more direct and less problematical; new achievements are seen in a more matter-of-fact light.*

A pioneer in performance and video, Wolfgang Stoerchle was an important influence for many artists in both fields. He was born in Baden-Baden in 1948, imigrating to Canada when he was 16 years old. He then moved to the United States and studied at the University of Oklahoma. Stoerchle came out to California in the late 60's to the University of California at Santa Barbara. There he worked on the environment-al-sound pieces and performance-sculpture. It was at Cal-Arts that he began working in video, developing his body pieces and psycho-drama performances.

Wolfgang moved to New York for awhile working exclusively in video. He also spent some time in Mexico, and became increasingly interested in mysticism. His last performance was given in Los Angeles in 1976 in John Baldessari's studio. A few months later he died in an automobile accident in Santa Fe, New Mexico.*
