The Telluride Ideas Festival invites you to join this gathering of leading thinkers, policy makers and others engaged in the process of reinventing work: four days of original presentations, panel discussions, public forums and special events.

Today's revolution in information technology is forcing all of us — nations, organizations, families and individuals — to reassess and redefine our work lives. As we shift from an industrial to an information society, a new work force is emerging: more educated, entrepreneurial, and increasingly female. Some of us are making our home our workplace. Multiple careers are transforming education into lifelong learning. We have only begun to understand the implications of substituting robots and computers for human tasks. Today's new global economy is impelling us towards an historic and massive redistribution of labor and production. All of these considerations

raise new social, economic and ecological challenges which will be discussed at the Telluride Ideas Festival.

The Telluride Ideas Festival will also present associated music and new theater performances, film and video screenings, a "Works in Progress" arts exhibition, and surprise events.

Programs will take place at the historic Sheridan Opera House, as well as other scenic indoor and outdoor locations around Telluride.

The Telluride Ideas Festival

Dear Friends,

This is your opportunity to join an international group of the people who are making our future, at a unique festival co-founded by social forecaster John Naisbitt.

It is your chance to listen to, meet and talk with John Naisbitt, Senator Albert Gore, Jr., D.-Tenn., energy analysts Amory and L. Hunter Lovins, Shirley Williams who is a major force in the revitalization of British politics, and others likewise engaged in the exciting tasks of speculation, conjecture, analysis and action.

The central jumping off point for the deliberations of the First Telluride Ideas Festival is the idea of "Reinventing Work." This notion cuts a lateral slice through many disciplines.

The program will be varied. There will be debates, performances, lectures, panel discussions, lots of give and take. We will all be, as advised by Ezra Pound, making it new, so we can't know exactly what to expect. What we do anticipate, given the ingredients, is that the procedures will be characterized by dense information, debate, irreverence, passion and delight.

Telluride is a place which facilitates the extraordinary. A tiny town first built by miners, it lies tucked into a magnificent cul de sac box canyon, and is hugged all round by mountains of great power and beauty. The town is full of charm and rough edges, an unreconstructed genuine community, and it hums with the energy of a powerfully activated campus on special occasions, as during the now internationally enjoyed, appreciated and respected Telluride Film Festival.

In the early 19th century 70% of the work force in the USA was employed in agricultural production, now the figure is 3% and still declining. There is speculation that if the Information Revolution takes the same course as the Industrial Revolution, which it appears to be doing, then within a couple of generations 10% of the work force may be adequate for all agricultural and industrial production.

It would seem that we all address enormous shifts in what it is to be human. In view of this, what choices can we make?

At the Telluride Ideas Festival a powerful group of thinkers, makers, scientists, entrepreneurs, artists, teachers and prophets will bring us reports hot from the cutting edge.

There will be lots of art - music, visual, literary at the Telluride Ideas Festival. This is partly because we like art, and partly because we believe that often the early insights into the nature of the multiplex unfolding present, and some of the strategies for living it, happen in art. The ideas, the people, the art and the mountains add up to a heady and substantial meal for the mind.

This is your opportunity to share in the power and optimism that come from working at the very edge of change. Great and accelerating change is one constant in modern life. This is a chance to participate in the shaping of that change towards a better world, to increase the domain within which we act rather than simply are acted upon.

This is a chance to move away from the abstract and mass produced, to "high touch" dialogue with people, up close, intimate energized. This is the first annual Telluride Ideas Festival. It promises to become a very important part of our intellectual landscape. We invite you to be there at the beginning.


