Dear Gene:

Woody Vasulka told me that you would be coming to Europe at the same time he is, and suggested that we try to put together a roundtable on the aspects of video that concern us the most. Woody and Steina will be coming to Paris just before the Amsterdam event and will show their work on the 25th, 27th and 29th of January. I would like to do a roundtable with you and Woody and myself on the topic of two-way flow and the future of video. We could do it on Tuesday or Thursday of the same week.

I was recommended for a Guggenheim this year and have enclosed a copy of my project proposal, which quotes you in a brief outline of video's role in contemporary evolution and two-way flow of communication. I think we share similar concerns about the future of the medium.

I feel it is extremely important to do something on this topic and at this level in France now since the new government is about to redesign the French television law. At just about that time the new law should be in debate in parliament. I would like to do this with simultaneous interpretation to make it as accessible as possible to the French, possibly video or audio taped. I can't offer you very much, only \$200 to help cover your expenses.

Woody will also be in touch with you, since it was his idea. Maybe he already has been. Please let me know as soon as you can; I hope we can work it out. It would be a very important time for your first presentation here, and I think that your presentation could not be at a more appropriate moment in terms of its effect. I look forward to hearing from you.
